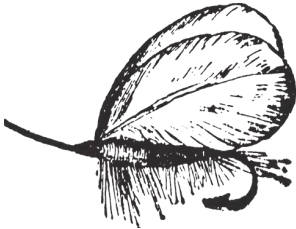


Area Rules and Regulations

- Fishing is not allowed in the hatchery raceways, or in the three outlets specified on the area map.
- Outside fish food is prohibited for fish health.
- Dogs must be leashed at all times.
 - No pets permitted inside the center, ADA service animals only.
- No hunting and trapping.
- No littering.
- No fires and fireworks.
- Camping is not permitted.
- Motorized vehicles are not permitted off-road.
- Removal of vegetation, including wildflowers, is prohibited. Nuts, berries, fruits, mushrooms, and wild greens can be collected for personal use only.

Please consult the Wildlife Code for regulations on size, species, permits, and bait restrictions on various portions of Lake Taneycomo.

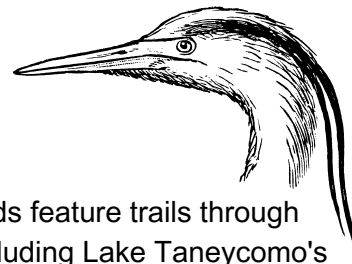
Conservation Education Center

Shepherd of the Hills Fish Hatchery (SOTH) is the largest trout-rearing facility operated by the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC). Located in Branson below Table Rock Dam, it features a Conservation Education Center for public education on trout, aquatic life, and Missouri wildlife. Here visitors can explore the education center, raceway pools, trails, and fishing access.



The Hatchery

Shepherd of the Hills Fish Hatchery raises more than one million brown and rainbow trout each year. Many of these fish are released into Lake Taneycomo. The remainder are distributed to other MDC trout-managed areas and trout parks across Missouri. None of these fish are sold. Construction of the hatchery started in 1957, with trout production beginning in 1958 after the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers completed Table Rock Dam, creating Table Rock Lake. The dam releases cold water (averaging 48 degrees F) from the bottom of Table Rock Lake into Lake Taneycomo. This creates an ideal environment for trout, however fluctuating water levels in Lake Taneycomo hinder trout reproduction.



Area Features

The hatchery grounds feature trails through various habitats, including Lake Taneycomo's shoreline and rocky bluffs. It showcases sycamore, burr oak, and wildflowers. In the spring, visitors can enjoy flowering trees including wild plum and dogwood. Habitat improvements by the Missouri Department of Conservation promote native plants and wildlife, as well as timber stand improvements and invasive species removal. The area offers excellent opportunities for observing native wildlife, such as songbirds, herons, and wintering birds of prey such as bald eagles and hawks.

SOTH Hatchery Facts

- It is the only MDC hatchery raising both rainbow and brown trout.
- Brown trout broodstock are collected from Lake Taneycomo for fall/winter spawning and returned to the lake afterwards.
- Rainbow trout broodstock are spawned in the fall and spring for a few years before being retired into the lake.
- Fertilized eggs are incubated in jars; eyes develop in two weeks, and they hatch into sac fry in a month.
- Trout are monitored and fed special commercial trout food. After a year and a half, 10–12-inch trout are ready to be stocked into Lake Taneycomo.
- Approximately 14 million gallons of water from Table Rock Lake flows through the hatchery each day.

Things To Do

Hatchery Tours- Guided hatchery tours are offered on weekdays periodically throughout the year.

Fish Feeding- Fish food is available for 25¢ from feed machines located near the hatchery raceways. Outside food is not permitted.

Education Center- Visitors will find exhibits, aquariums, reptiles, and an educational video showing how trout are raised in the hatchery.

Trails- Approximately 2.3 miles of trails showcasing a variety of Ozark landscapes.

Picnicking- A pavilion and tables are located near Lake Taneycomo. Another picnic area is located at the trailhead of the White River Bluff trail. Use is first-come-first serve.

Fishing- Fishing is allowed year-round in Lake Taneycomo. For specific rules and regulations, please refer to the Missouri Department of Conservation Fishing Regulations.
